
Mr. Olson was born March 17, 1933, on a farm near Volga to Gerhard and Harriet Annie (Pickering) Olson.

Another one of our sturdy old pioners answered the final summons the past week when Mat Reffling of Oslo towhship, passed away suddenly at his home last Thursday evening following a heart attack. Mr. Reffling had always led an active life, and Thursday morning over-exerted himself driving some live stock. For the past five years he had planned on retiring and moving into Volga where he expected to spend the remainder of his days, but each year, he had felt like he would like to stay by the old home "just one more year." He was a man highly respected by all.




